About the Organisation: -

*Nivedita Foundation Trust is a Non – Government Organisation registered in the 2006 under “**The Charitable and Religious Trust Act 1920**”. NF works with rights-based approach believing in developing women's leadership and work through women's collective, in order to enable them to bring structural changes and to strengthen the collectives. It mainly works in the favour of exploited and marginalized pushed to the thresholds of the society especially women and marginalized communities such as tribal, schedule caste people and minorities so that they could access their rights and be empowered. The organization believes that women should live a life of independence and dignity in a violence and exploitation free environment. In order to achieve the targets, the organization vows to create a strong network of women able to create pressure groups so that at the time of injustice even administration and government could be pressurized to take impartial decisions so that lives of women and marginalized could not be hindered.*

*To achieve its objectives NF has created strategic network with women and concerned stakeholders. Presently, NF is supporting a women's collective called **Chhattisgarh Mahila Manch** spread across Chhattisgarh. CMM is an active, powerful and effective state level organization of voluntarily motivated and dedicated women and activists used to raise women related to issues and decisively fights for their rights and violence against women. From providing medico-legal support to counselling it helps the women to evolve as leaders, contribute in decision making for their own cause. Mass mobilization on the women centric issues is another prominent agenda of CMM. 20,000 women were mobilized on issue of Gender equity, Land rights for women, joint ownership (Husband and wife) of land (home steed and agriculture) alcoholism and displacement. NF carried out study and made documentation on women's rights in Chhattisgarh.*

*The Foundation also formed “**Sabariya Samgathan**” a state level forum working with the issues related to Sabariya: the most marginalized among tribals. This forum is working towards improvement of education, health and livelihood scenario along with their identity recognition as schedule tribe.*

NF roped 365 Adolescents girls and formed network named as Chhattisgarh Kishori Balika Sangathan which again formed active village level Adolescent Girls organisation (named as Kishori Balika Sangathan).

Our Vision: -

A society based on scientific principles, free from disparity, inequality, violence where everyone enjoys the dignified life and there is no sign of repression, atrocity, exploitation.

- To promote humanitarian rights and culture through working towards Dalits, Tribal's, women and children from vulnerable and distress groups.
- By education and recognition, we can build a dent free society; strengthen local governance to safeguard the rights and interest of its inhabitants.

Our Mission: -

A society free from dogmatism, untouchability and social gender-based discrimination, where specially the women and girls have access to education, health, livelihood and had rights over property resources, the participation in decision making process at each level by women and overall, where women and girls may enjoy a dignified life.

- Empowerment of marginalized people especially **Dalits, Tribal, Women and vulnerable weaker section of society.**
- Initiate, strengthen and building a healthy society inherent with knowledge to understanding their constitutional rights and interests.

Main Objectives: -

- To support weaker section people of India, irrespective of their caste, creed, religion and sex to achieve moral, socio-economic, educational and spiritual rights and interests.
- To establish just a human society devoid of violence, exploitation inequality, unemployment, which can be ascertained by community organizations, also the people's advocating, asserting and striving for their needs and aspirations.
- To acumen a group of fellows who can inherit themselves.

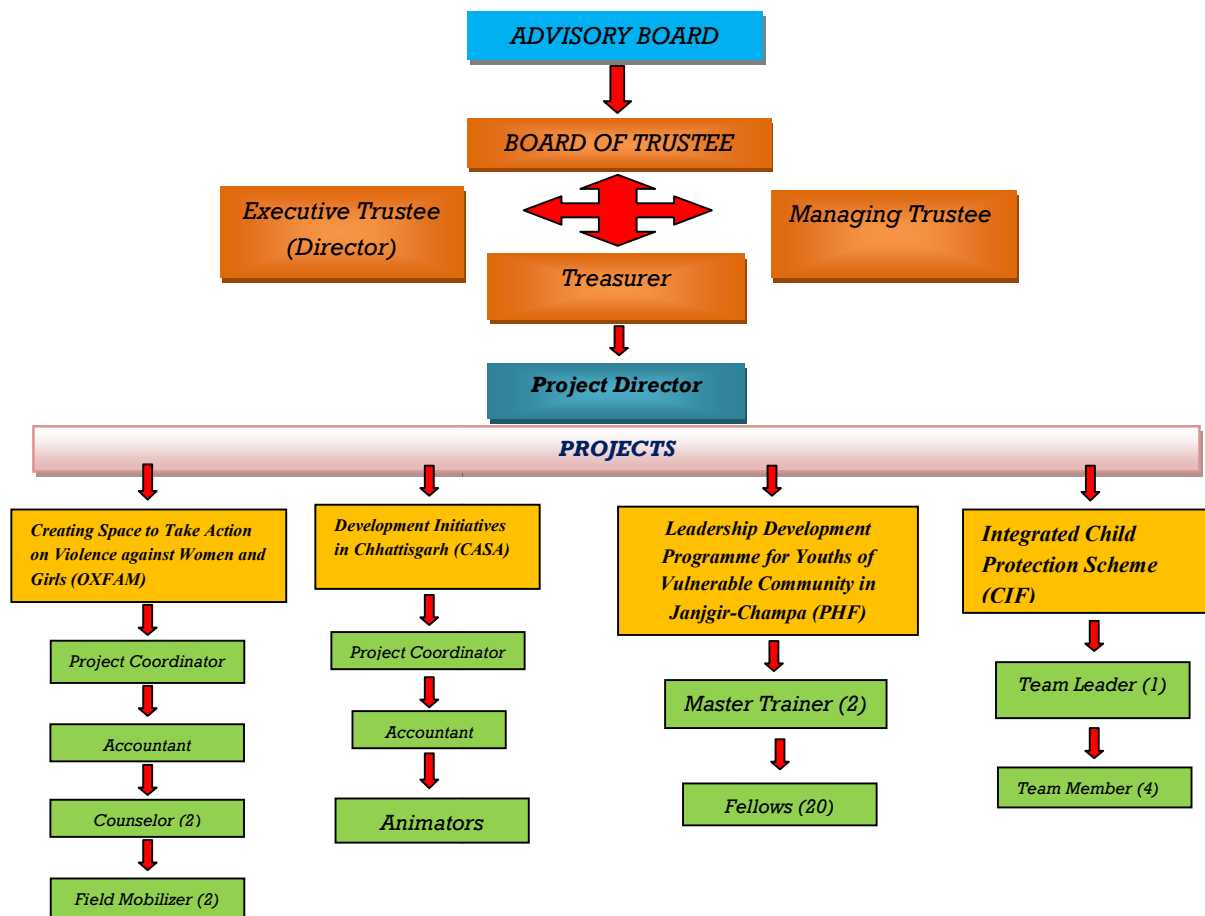
Outreach & Coverage

Nivedita Foundation has strong presence in the state of Chhattisgarh. We reached out to 9531 people in rural Chhattisgarh directly and 20524 people indirectly. The area of operation includes-

- 4 blocks namely Sakti, Dabhra, Malkhorda & Bamhnindih in Janjgir-Champa district.
- Sarangar block of Raigarh district and Bhasma block of Korba district.
- Total 37 Gram Panchayats.
- Total 62 villages.

From the last two months in this financial year 2018-19, we have collaborated with 'Childline India Foundation' and set up Child Line Sub – Centre to extend Childline services and implementation of 'Integrated Child Protection Scheme' to 4 blocks Sakti, Dabhra, Malkhorda & JaiJaipur of Janjgir – Champa district. We reached out to 305 gram panchayats 458 villages and both directly as well as indirectly benefitted 653036 people along with 261214 children resides in that geographical area.

Creating Space to Take Action on Violence Against Women and Girls

The project implemented in 20 villages of Dabhra block of Janjgir-Champa district of Chhattisgarh. The project includes three fold approaches including –

- **Preventive approach** – aims to undertake preventive measures to address domestic violence against women and girls and child early and forced marriage, this includes gender sensitization of youth, adolescents, men and women to change their traditional perceptions as to gender roles & responsibilities. This is done by working with village level community based organizations, adolescents youth groups (girls & boys), women and men groups through gender training, improving local resource based livelihood options, develop women leadership quality, village to block and district level women forums along with strengthening **Chhattisgarh Mahila Manch**, the women collective at state level to have a strong grassroots presence on issues related to women & girls across project area to state level.
- The second approach is **Redressal measures**; this involves supporting and empowering survivors of violence to get justice. Specific interventions also designed along with formal & informal support services to boost the self-confidence of survivors to take decisions and social, psychological, economic and legal support.



- *The third approach includes **Advocacy** and policy level changes and effective execution of PWDVA. Regular advocacy resulted as a pressure mechanism to enable effectiveness in execution.*

The objectives of the project given below –

- *Engaging key community actors to support and promote positive gender norms.*
- *Supporting women and girls who have experienced violence.*
- *Building knowledge and capacity of institutions and alliances to influence change.*

Workshops/training undertaken with influencers on legal frameworks

Total 129 participants took part in the two meetings. Out of this 97 were male and 32 were female. In this meeting the newly elected PRI members and Sarpanch, District level Secretary and president from Sathnami Community, block level secretary of Patel community attended the meet. As most of the newly elected PRI members were already aware of the work undertaken as part of the project, they were given a brief description followed by a detailed discussion on what issues will be addressed by the participants in their areas-

- *Resham Kurre, District President of Satnami community resolved to be vigilant in ensuring that all*



children from their community completes elementary education specially girl child so that the educational foundation is firm.

- He also committed to take steps towards building the leadership qualities of Sathnami women and provide them opportunity to process in life.
- He also reiterated that all marriage cards of their community will contain the age proof so that the child marriages can be stopped.
- PadmabatiSidar resolved to address the issue of manufacturing of country liquor in her panchayat. In this context she sought help from the members of youth and women collectives. She has initiated the process as an initial step she has mapped out the households involved in making illegal country liquor and have given them 10 days' time to stop this illegal business or else they have to pay a penalty of Rs. 10,000.
- The PRI members present resolved to organise sports like kabbadi etc. for women during the 16 days of Activism. This resolution was passed during the special gram sabha on the occasion of International Women's Day.
- Bhoj Kumari, Sarpanch of Odekeria resolved to penalise anyone who is involved in domestic violence of any form.
- The Sarpanch of Kekrabhat Ratnabati, resolved to hold bi-annual meetings specifically for the adolescent girls to understand from them their problem. These will be discussed in gram sabha and appropriate decisions will be taken.
- The elected women Sarpanch mentioned that they will break the trend of Sarpanch Patti - where the husband of the Sarpanch becomes the actual discussion maker and the real Sarpanch i.e. the wife becomes a puppet of her husband.

Exchange visits/linkages coordinated with influencers and youth

Total 534 participants took part in 2 youth festivals out of this 270 were male and 261 were female. During the youth festival various activity-based stalls were set up. Each activity has a message on gender equality. For instance, the game “**Tan Se Maan Tak**” helped the participants understand the science behind determination of sex of an unborn and that the women have no role in deciding the sex of her child. Similarly, to make both the genders appreciate the work of each other One-minute

game was organised. In this game boys and men were given the challenge of making rotis in one minute and girls and women were given the task of fixing wire and to nail on a piece of wood. Besides these, we also organised posters making and drawing competitions on the theme on the 'Marzi Bina Shaadi Nahi'. In the same pattern this equality mela was organised in Raipur as well. The Mela was inaugurated by the Vice Chancellor of Pt. Ravi Shankar Shukla University Prof. Keshri Verma.

विश्वीय परामर्शदाता द्वारा आक्सफ़ोर्ड इंडिया के सहयोग से धुरकोट में समानता मेला का आयोजन किया गया। समानता मेले के उद्देश्य पर प्रकाश डालते हुए विवेकिता परामर्शदाता की उपस्थिति में कहा कि समानता मेला का आयोजन इसलिए किया गया है कि समाज में लड़कियाँ-लड़कियों और महिलाएँ अपने जिम्मेदारियों को समझे, एक दूसरे के अधिकारों का सम्मान करें और एक दूसरे के काम में हाथ बटाने हुए पारिवारिक जिम्मेदारियों को निभाने में सक्षम हों।

समानता और न्याय, निर्णय में पक्षोपेक्षी सुनिश्चित करने के मुद्दों को अपने बड़ने के लिए ही हर जगह में समानता मेले का आयोजन किया जा रहा है। मुख्य अतिथि ने कहा कि महिलाएं बेटे और बेटियों में भेदभाव ना करें।

विश्वीय परामर्शदाता आक्सफ़ोर्ड इंडिया के साथ-साथ हर किसी को मर्जी शामिल करना चाहिए। समानता मेले में जेंडर समानता के बारे में खेल के माध्यम से प्रतिभागियों को समझाया गया। जैसे एकमिन्ट के खेल में रोटी चावल चुनने, सुई में धागा डालने वाले खेल शामिल थे। इसी तरह लड़कियों के लिए बिजली के तार जोड़ना, काले ठोकना शामिल था, इस खेल का उद्देश्य यह था कि पुरुष एवं नारी एक दूसरे के काम को समझे और किसी के काम को हीन भावना से ना देखें। बाल विवाह रोकने तथा पॉक्सो के कानून के बारे में किताब और पोस्टर बांट कर मेले में आये लोगों को जागरूक किया गया। इस मेले में मितवा, सांप-सीढ़ी, सुंदरता का राज जैसे स्टाल के माध्यम से लैंगिक असमानता और उसके दुष्परिणाम को समझाया गया। मेले के अंत में ड्राइंग प्रतियोगिता, स्लोगन राइटिंग, शार्ट विडियो क्लीप प्रतियोगिता में भाग लेने वाले बच्चों को प्रमाण पत्र, मेडल, टाफी देकर सम्मानित किया गया। मेले में हलधर पटेल, जीआर जाटवर, सुरेंद्र कुमार राणा, चंद्रिका कौशल शामिल थे।

Local community groups supported for capacity building

The findings of the last score cards, helped to understand the utility of the tool, hence this time they were much more interested and excited to undertake the exercise. During the filling up of score card process very detailed discussion on each of the questions took place. The scores were reached at after substantial discussion only. Since this exercise was done by the collective members earlier as well, they were well versed with the process, objective and questions which led to swift implementation of this activity.

Communications materials developed for influencers, youth and children

Considering the fact that Indian Cinema plays a very influencing role in the society especially on youth, OIN developed a module on Film Appreciation and Women's Rights. The purpose of this toolkit is to help young people explore and understand gender norms and stereotypes through popular media and explore how popular media (films) perpetuates and deepens stereotypes. At the same time, the toolkit explores how some mainstream movies are also helping to change the traditional norms by presenting alternate realities. The sessions helped the students to deepen their understanding of patriarchy, gender inequality and internalize the message easily. Some of the participants stated that "We watch films, but never realized how it teaches us gender inequality." Henceforth, "I will have very different viewpoints." said Raj Singh. Another participant, Dhaneshwar adds, "I watched movies for entertainment, never realized the subtle ideas it perpetuated." Gautami Rao says, "I never realized how female actors are made to propagate negative social norms; this session was an eye opener".



Total 2 workshops were conducted in CS project geography on FAM. In the FAM workshop there total 94 participants out this 37 were female and 57 were male. The participants mentioned that they had never earlier watched cinema from the gender lenses and this training helped them understand how gender inequality is subtly promoted by films. The participants also opined that songs in the film, also promotes gender inequality which they never realised until attending the training.

Support service organizations financially assisted

Objective: to provide psycho-socio legal services to women and girls who have experienced violence.

The different types of cases were registered i.e. dowry, black magic, extra-marital affairs, misunderstanding of relationship in-laws, and another main issue were found was birth of a girl child.

Some cases were solved through one-time counselling and community meeting.

Through meetings, women came to know about legal aid, DVA, CEFM and women rights. In wider numbers woman are participating to understand the power and legal rights of laws.

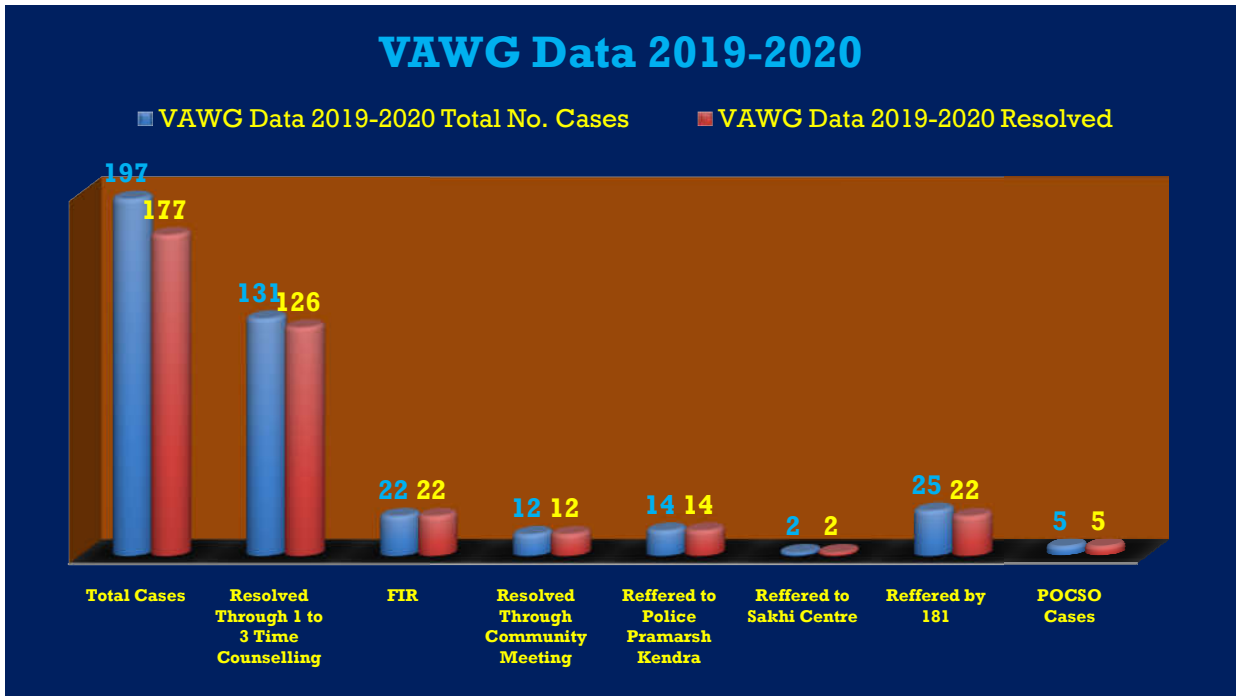

Outcomes:

- a. Self-confidence have increased among the groups
- b. The women and girl, who have been experienced violence, are now started reporting.
- c. Understanding their self-importance in their life.
- d. Women now understand their women and economic rights.

- e. During meetings, other women are also participating in the meetings to receive information on legal framework.
- f. Parents take consent from daughter and son for marriage.
- g. Through meeting, they know how to file case and report to whom?



The above graph shows that during the year 2019-2020, the total numbers of cases were reported is 197, out of which 177 cases were resolved

Workshops/training held for support service providers on gender sensitivity

In 2 meetings total 306 out of these 226 women and 80 men participated. The first meeting was attended by Protection Officers from all the 9 blocks of the district, District Programme Officer of Janjgir-Champa, Committee members of District level Women and child permanent Committee, officials One stop Centre, member Child Welfare Committee.



The following are some of core findings of the community score card was shared by our implementing partner.

- Women do not know specific reporting process under PWDVA. Though they know that one can go to police station and complain.*
- Chhattisgarh showed a decline in the level of awareness of DLSA lawyers on PWDV Act.*
- The awareness level of people in Chhattisgarh regarding child marriage law increased as compare to the first round of scores collected.*
- Community's level of awareness on Child Marriage Prohibition Officers has increased in Chhattisgarh.*
- The score card also indicated a need for more awareness drives on CHILDLINE.*
- Registration of marriages is also an area of concern in Chhattisgarh.*

This was followed by a discussion on social norms.

Action points-

- District level Women and Child Development department will organise a meeting to disseminate the findings of the score card where the police officials will be invited.
- District Child Protection Officer assures to organise more awareness drives about child rights and CHILDLINE.
- In addition to this the department will take up the issue of cases where action from police is pending.
- District Programme Officer assured to organise regular meeting of Protection Officers for faster disposal of DV cases.



The second meeting was attended by Judicial Magistrate Bharati Kuldeep, Rakesh Roshan Mahant Special Educator on POCSO Act, officials from Department of Women and Child Development and Child Development Project Officers of Sakti, besides these 164 survivors attended the meeting. The main objective of this meeting was to provide a platform to service providers and survivors to bring them together. Some of the survivors like Khileshwari Patel told the service providers specifically to the judicial magistrate that her case is pending in her court since last one year. Similarly, Chanchal Rathore also mentioned about domestic violence in her home, this case was resolved during the meeting by the magistrate who asked the husband not to indulge

in domestic violence, and if he does so, he will have to face legal consequences. As a result of this interactive meeting 3 cases were resolved in a span of one week.

Workshops/ training held with women and girls on their rights, building their confidence, leadership skills and capacity to self-advocate to access support services

Total 24 meetings were conducted and through these meetings 500 women were reached- Following are some of the important steps taken by the members of the collectives-



- *During the campaigning of PRI election members of the women collectives demanded for equal wage for equal work for women.*
- *Women from all the project villages raised the demand for sports competition for women. Their demand was accepted in the gram sabha of Komo, Girgida, Shankarpali, Kekrabhat, Odekeram and Kauli.*
- *In Kekrabhat village the Srapanch resolved to hold bi annual meeting with the adolescent girls to discuss their issues and if need be taken resolutions to resolve these issues.*

Take steps towards increasing participation in the gram sabhas so that the Sabha takes positive resolution for equal wage for women and such other issues.

Out of 100 participants from whom feedback was sought 88 participants i.e. 88% provided positive feedback.

Economic and livelihood opportunities identified for women and girls who have experienced violence or CEFM



Based on the years' experience, it was found that women and girls lack skills of trading and have very limited understanding of marketing. Therefore, this year such trades were identified which would help them to generate at least some profit. In this process the following items like food processing, phenyl making, detergent making, agarbatti (Incense sticks) making and trading of sanitary napkins. It was also discussed and decided that some villages will work on production of materials they will work as hub from here other women will collect materials and sell them. Due to lock down the women could not start the manufacturing process.

Workshops/training held to raise awareness of local stakeholders and women and girls on the importance of supporting women's economic rights

During the 40 meetings total 394 participants took part. Out of this 256 were women and 138 were male. In the first 20 meetings the issue of equal wages for men and women was explained. In addition to this the participants were asked to list down different types of activities undertaken by women from dawn to night and number of activities undertaken by men from dawn to night. This was followed by discussion on what kind of the work – productive, reproductive and community. Then the number of productive, reproductive and community work undertaken by men and women was compared. The main focus of the discussion how care work deprives women from her

rights to community and productive work. Anusuya Yadav, ASHA from Kanwli said, "I never realised that we women silently contribute to the economy at the cost of our rights, this is an eye-opening meeting for me".

Biradhar Baisnav, teacher of Akaljamora, said, "I never realised that women in my family has been contributing towards the economy of our household, it a lifetime learning for me."

During the meetings in the village's discussion took place on the issue of entitlement of land rights of women. The total nos. of participants were 198 (Male-67, female-131). The participants of the meeting were encouraged to disseminate the message that daughters too have equal rights on both violable and non inviolable assists viz. land. In addition to this the role of women in farming is about 90% but their work is never recognised neither in private space nor in public space. The participants have also sent postcards to Chief Minister to recognise women as farmers.

Create mentorships/linkage with technical experts to support Women and girl-led Enterprises

So far nine reflective sessions and training with women has taken place. The total numbers of female participants were 72, who attended the training. A mentor has been engaged who has analysed the setback which took place in the economic endeavour undertake by the women earlier. Following are some of the challenges outlines in the report

- a) Non- Availability of raw materials & its purchase links
- b) Locating the source of cost-effective machines is a major challenge
- c) Non-Consideration of locally available resources/products which are readily available for sale.

Our visit was mainly focused on field training & start the manufacturing of Washing Powder & Phenyl. 25 women entrepreneurs participated in the training cum meeting from 4 Villages of block- Dhabra. This was done on 5th & 6th March 2020. In addition, a model-cum-distribution centres was also created.

The first manufacturing centre was organized at Dhurkot. Washing Powder & Phenyl was manufactured, packed & distributed amongst the participants to show them to the consumers. In continuation with the training cum meetings, visits to different villages like Odekera, Sankarpali, Mukta&Kekrabhat was made to help with the field training on the spot to the selling group. Account keeping & investment was also scheduled up.

Below are the main objectives of the training: -

- *Product selection for sales & manufacturing & trading.*
- *Linkage with experts & various suppliers of materials.*
- *A stable model of sustainable sales/manufacturing process.*
- *Field trainings was provided to evaluate & ensure the potentials of participants as well as the area.*

Further to this, a continuous monitoring will be done for the next 03 Months to ensure the continuity of the business model.

Conclusion:

To conclude this training schedule for Women & Girls, it was focused on their respectful livelihood & sustainable earnings.

Women and girls who have experienced violence supported on enterprise developed or other income generating activities

Total 72 women and girls who have experienced VAWG/CEFM were given refresher training on hand-wash, detergent and phenyl making. They were also trained on marketing and helped to market their first lot of produce. Out of 72 women, 12 women have started making phenyl. In the first lot they made 60 bottles of phenyl and so far, they have sold 50% of the product and made a profit of Rs. 750. To increase their market reach and income they are now approaching government offices as well, and hope to continue the initiative.

Santhoshi Rathor says, "I never thought that I could earn someday, I am grateful that I was few of the chosen ones who got the training in hand-wash making". Delighted Sarita says, "this training allows me to stay at home and still be financially productive, I am so happy". Additionally, out of 72 women 18 women and girls who showed much interest in setting up entrepreneurship unit were provided training on mushroom, poultry, fishery, vegetable farming and piggery and dairy farming.

Training cum Exposure Visit

On 20th and 21st March 2020, 24 women participants from Kekrabhat, Odeker, Shankarpali, Komo, Kabaripali, Saraipali village Dhabra block, Chhattisgarh visited Gopal Biotech Agro Farming, Bargarh. The main purpose of the visit was to learn Mushroom Farming, Livestock, Poultry, Goatery, Piggery that women can start income generation activity in their village.

GBAF is promoting different livelihood options to the rural poor like mushroom farming with providing spawn, honey-bee, vermin compost, goatery and organic farming. Besides that, we have been organizing skill-based entrepreneurs training programme to the individual and different SHG women of western Odisha under WORLP, IWDP, NWDPPRA watersheds, SGSSY and under different schemes.

*The objectives of entrepreneurship training programs conducted by **GOPAL BIOTECH AGRO FARM, KENDUPALI** are:*

- 1. To impart new knowledge*
- 2. To equip participants with tools for better performance*
- 3. To change mindsets and attitudes*

*One of the unique features of GBAF capacity building programs is "Field Exposure",

Day 1-

Training programme on micro enterprise specialization in Mushroom Farming by Birendra Badhan and Surabhi Sahu



Cultivation of paddy straw mushroom using paddy straw is the oldest and commonly used technique but it gives very low mushroom yield (10-15% of dry substrate). This mushroom has the ability to grow at a higher temperature (28-35°C) It can be grown on comparatively cheaper agro-industrial wastes It is fast growing thus has very short cropping cycle (30 days). Its cultivation technology is easy. It has good acceptability at



consumers' level National Status: In India, this mushroom is cultivated under natural conditions in Orissa, but with low mushroom yield. International Status: It is cultivated in most of the South East Asian countries like Taiwan, Indonesia, Thailand and China. China alone produces around 6, 00, 000 tons of this mushroom annually, both for local and foreign market. Wetting of substrate to achieve 60-65% moisture. Outdoor composting for 4 days Filling on racks in cropping room at a thickness of 12-15cm Pasteurization on next day with in cropping room at 62-64°C for 3-4 hours Conditioning at 45-50°C for 2-3 days till complete elimination of Ammonia Cooling of substrate to bring temperature at 30-35°C and spawning Spawn run for 4-5 days at 32-35°C Removal of plastic sheets from spawned substrate and maintaining room temperature at 28-32°C, RH-80-85%, intermittent fresh air circulation and fluorescent light for 4-5 hours/day.

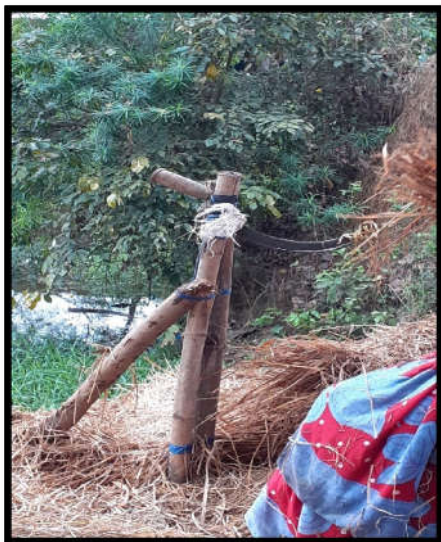
Starting of first flush harvest after 9-10 days of spawning Total harvesting period of 15-20 days harvesting at button stage, packaging and sale of fresh produce within one day.

Next visited integrated farming promoted by agriculture department Govt. of Odisha near Saranda Gate where team gain the knowledge on all in one spot like, fish farming, duckery, quail, goatery, apiculture vermin compost etc.



After the exposure session team led by Birendra Padhan explained the sheep and goat farming at one of the biggest farms of Odisha like State livestock breeding farm, Chiplima, Kalamati Sambalpur where team learned different varieties of goat and sheep basically adoptable to our area.



Conclusion: -

Overall, 2 days exposure visit was successfully organized by GBAF, Bargrah and we hope that the learning's will help the women to start mushroom farming and other activities.

Success Stories & Case Studies

Youth of Komo shows their courage for Social Inclusion.

In Komo village there are 1200 population and 152 houses, among them 50 belongs to Patel community consists of large farmers & upper caste people, 70 belongs to Sidar Adibasi community, 20 belongs to Satnami community and rest of 12 belongs to Dhobi community.



During Durga Puja, donations collected from all the households of the community

but it is mutually restricted for those 32 households consisting Satnami & Dhobi community to take part in the worship and also not allowed to attend the feast organized in last day where all the people of the village used to have their meal for that day.

As N.F working in Komo village on gender equality and violence against women in the past 2 years and accordingly a Youth group has formed and members trained on various social issues along with women rights and violence against women. The members use to seat together and discuss various issues associated with them and their village.

During a monthly meeting on August one of member told that the collection of donations for Durga Puja has been started for this year and immediately Ramesh Kumar Karsh said that we (Dhobi community people) are only donate but not allowed to take part neither on worship nor feast. After that a long discussion it has been decided that the members of youth group

will organize a meeting with the entire village people along with the members of committee responsible to organize the Puja.

In this meeting youth group members highlighted the legal provisions along with constitutional rights and the concept of equality and convinced the people of the



village. Bharat Lal Barman (leader of youth group) said that 'on the one hand we are

using their donations to organize the event (worship & feast) and other hand we are not allowing them to participate the event although they paid for the same' and 'what type of culture is this?' he also ask a question to the village people.

It has been decided that all the village people including Dhobi & Satnami community, participated in worship of Durga and feast. It is also decided that anyone interested to cook the food or willing to help in cooking will be allowed. Sarpanch of the village Ms. Chanchala Patel said that we will organize the event as a festival of our village and she also invited all the sections of the community to participate and involve for successfully conduction of the event.

And according to the decision this year creates a landmark for Komo village, when all the 1200 people of the village participated in Durga Puja and a grand feast.

Establishing Women Resource Centre at Panchayat Bhavan

Name: - Chanchala Patel.

Age: - 37 years,

Village: - Komo. Panchayat:- Komo, Block: - Dabhra , District :- Janjgir-Champa.

Chanchala elected as a Sarpanch of the village panchayat on January 2014 and since then she has gone through the responsibility of a Sarpanch very well. As she has also been a member of Women's group organized by N.F since 2016 and Chanchala said "I gained a lot about PWDVA, CEFM and women's right and also got the skills to public speaking".

On the roundtable meeting with influencers, youth, men and boys on the issues related to positive norms modelling and awareness rising, Chanchala along with other

Sarpanch decided to established women resource centre in the Panchayat Bhavan.

Just after that Chanchala organized a meeting in Panchayat Bhavan with Up-Sarpanch, Sachib and Samajik Mukhiya and initially they have decided to dedicate a



space for establishing women resource centre. Then Chanchala talk to women of her village and staff of NF. In this meeting it has been decided that a space of panchayat bhavan will be allotted for women resource centre, NF will decorate the space and provide resource materials. At the very initial phase it is also decided that the centre will open for two days weekly Tuesday & Friday so that those women coming for immunization may also avail the services of the centre.

Mr. Umesh Dansena, Panchayat Sachib said that 'it is also one of the major agenda of Panchayat to spread the awareness among people on domestic violence and women rights through organizing meetings, Aam Sabha etc. and women resource centre helping us enriching our knowledge to do so'.

Currently women from Komo village regularly visits women resource centre and initiate discussion on various issues related to women rights and laws. They use resource materials and planning to set up a library fully equipped with resource materials related to women, they also planning to maintain a register visitor.

Collective Effort Story- Odeker

The women and youth of Odekar decided before the 2020 Sarpanch election that this time they will remove the former sarpanch Balik Ram Patel, who has been the sarpanch for the last 20 years.

There are a total of 1200 families in Odeker Panchayat. Nearby, there is a village named Chachung Saraipali, which belongs to the Odeker Panchayat, which has a total family number of about 300. The sarpanch Balik Ram Patel is from Chachung Saraipali, and before every Sarpanch election he used to give money to the people in order to win the election. Till date he has not done any development work in the name of sarpanch. The people of Odeker decided that, this election we will choose a new sarpanch. The Youth Sangathan of Odeker also fully supported. Everyone from the community, members of the women's Sangathan and members of the Youth Sangathan held a meeting before the election. The women nominated Bhojmati Kumari for the post of sarpanch. The Youth Sangathan and all the men of the village also gave their support. It was also decided in the meeting that no person would take or give money to anyone in the name of vote, and the Youth Sangathan was asked to monitor the persons coming from outside. 10 days before the Sarpanch elections, all the women Sangathan members, Youth Sangathan members started campaigning

vigorously. The women supported the Youth Sangathan in monitoring. All outbound visitors were closely monitored.

As a result, no one stood for the post of sarpanch against Bhojmati Kumari. Bhojmati won the sarpanch election with a full majority. There was an atmosphere of joy in the whole village.

Bhojmati Kumari says, she was hesitant to contest for the post of sarpanch, but with the support of the Women and Youth Sangathan, I get strength and contested for the post. Whatever decision has to be taken for the development of the panchayat, it will be not me but everyone will participate in the decision making process.

In the Odekerla Panchayat, 11 out of 7 women are elected as panch (PRI members), who are also members of the women's sangathan.

For the last 2 months, whatever case of female violence or any other issue related to girls reported; it is decided in the panchayat itself.

Story of Odekerla Panchayat

Odekerla village is a tribal populated area, 30 KM away from the main town of Dabhra block, dist- Janjgir-Champa of Chhattisgarh. A total of 1200 families live in Odekerla village. The main livelihood of the people is farming and some people migrate to the cities for livelihood.

It is common for people to sell and consume alcohol. Drinking alcohol at wedding festivals is a common thing in society. Domestic violence was a common thing; no one even raised a voice against it. Many women did not even have PAKKA house, ration cards.

Since 2016, Nivedita Foundation, a social service organization in collaboration with OXFAM India, started working against domestic violence and other issues in Odekerla village. Initially, it was very difficult to gather women for the meeting. Shipra Devi (Nivedita Foundation Trust, Director) says "I still remember; only 6 to 7 women attended our first meeting. Today, after 4 years of struggle, all women join me to raise their voice against domestic violence."

Being a tribal region, it was not surprising to see women selling and drinking alcohol. And it was also common for a woman to become a victim of violence due to alcohol.

That is why Nivedita Foundation planned a strategy to tackle the issue that how can we first ban alcohol and bring all women together under one umbrella. Gradually the number of women started increasing in the meeting. Soon a Women's organization was formed in Odeker.

According to the module given by OXFAM India, women were given training on rights and other information in every meeting. We also talked about how alcohol promotes domestic violence.

Today, due to the unity of women, drinking and selling liquor is stopped in the entire village. If someone sells, severe action is taken against him.

Previously, women and adolescent girls were communicated with abusive words everywhere, even in the house; the Women's organisation stopped it too.

Women after knowing their rights, 2 women Naan KuwarRathia and Kanhai Mati who did not have a PAKKA house got their home under Indra Awas Scheme. 4 women Kanti Rathia, Meena Rathia, Anita Rathia and Sarda Bai received ration cards.

In the Odeker Panchayat, 11 out of 7 are women are PRI members, who are also members of the women's organization. Even in recent Sarpanch Election, Bhojmati Kumari elected as Sarpanch, she is also from Women's organisation. Till now there were 4 cases of domestic violence, which are decided in the Panchayat itself.

Chandra Kanti Rathia is a Mitannin and conscious woman says that "At first I knew nothing about violence and women's rights. When I attended the meeting, I came to know about DV Act 2005. Today, I tell everyone about the side effects of domestic violence, and if a woman is in violence then I stand with her.

Youth Organisation is also formed in Odeker, and Youth have played their role in supporting the Women's Organisation eradicating evils of the society.

YOUTH COLLECTIVE EFFORT STORY- KOMO

The main objective of this story was to somehow stop the trade of alcohol and make the villagers aware of the side effects.

The incident took place in December 2019, the Komo Panchayat, where the trade and grandeur of the liquor traders increased. He was openly doing his liquor business.

Bharat Burman and Yaklesh Dharma are members of the Komo Youth Organization, determined that somehow the trade of Mahua Daru (Desi Liquor) will have to be stopped. Both of them started monitoring along with the rest of the members. A person from the nearby village of Nawapara used to take 5-6 liters of Mahua Daru daily to sell to his relative, who is a resident of village Komo.

Yaklesh Dharma and Bharat Burman made a plan, we will catch a person on the road while bringing liquor and hand him over to the panchayat.

Another fellow asked Ramesh Karsh to make a video of this entire incident.

They started monitoring every day. And after keeping vigil daily for about 10 days from 5 am to 7 am, that person got caught on 16 December 2019.

Immediately this information was given to Chanchala Patel, the sarpanch of Komo.

The sarpanch said, bring the person to the village, I am calling a meeting. In the meeting, the person confessed that he supplies liquor to his uncle. His uncle was also called and he too accepted that he sells liquor in the village.

At the meeting, the sarpanch and the rest of the members decided that "this time we leave this person with a warning that if he supplies liquor, Panchayat will file an FIR against him. Further Chanchala Patel says "liquor gives rise to violence, that's why If anyone does any kind of intoxicating trade in Komo Panchayat, then strict action will be taken against him."



Integrated Child Protection Scheme through Child Line Sub-Centre Sakti, Janjgir-Champa

During the project year April 2019-March 2020, Child Line Sub-Centre, Sakti reached out to people along withchildren of four blocks Sakti, Dabhra, Malkharoda & Jaijipur of Janjgir-Champa district, CG.

The ICPS is a centrally sponsored scheme of the Ministry of Women and Child



Development (MWCD) with a 3fold objective as follows -

- 1. Its unprecedented aim is to set in place a child protection infrastructure at the national, state and district level with outreach mechanisms that would penetrate blocks and villages.*
- 2. To provide for a continuum of child protection services beginning with emergency services through CHILDLINE 1098. This focuses adequately on community based non institutional interventions like adoption, foster care, after-care, revamping government owned residential institutions, and strengthening statutory bodies and mechanisms for child protection.*
- 3. To strengthen the knowledge, information management and strengthen capacities of stakeholders on child protection issues through various innovative interventions that include closing the loop and integrating police, state run and privately run residential services, hospitals etc. through a missing children tracking system, educating the public on protection issues, and training and capacity building of stakeholders across the various levels of the allied systems.*

The ICPS lays stress on the need for convergence; inter departmental coordination, and cross-sectored alliances with other ministries to create the partnerships required for ensuring a protective environment for children. Through the ICPS, CHILDLINE India Foundation (CIF) has been made the umbrella organization for CHILDLINE 1098

in India. Under the ICPS, CIF shall be given the status of a **"Mother NGO"** for running Child Line Service in the country.

Activities Details:-

Outreach- Outreach program is one of the main activity of Child Line, through which we share with child & parent the Rights of Child (0-18), all acts related to child etc in village to village, Anganwadis, Govt. Schools. During the year 2019-2020, we organised 198 Outreach programs, through which we are able to reach out 6729 children & parents.

Open House-this is an open forum for all to discuss upon child related issues & finding out the solution. During the year 2019-2020, we organised 9 Open House program and the participants were 360.

Child Line Se Dosti, is another program that aims at bringing the entire respective department together, who works for child related issues. As a result, it makes easier for the Child Line

Team to resolve the case without delay.

Intervention- It is the process of finding first hand information of the child. The child line team visits home, collects data regarding the child, and produces the child before Child Welfare Committee. If it is needed, medical check up is also done and report is submitted to respective department. 1. CASE STUDY -1

Forcible marriage of a minor to a crazy person was prevented

Case Type -Child Marriage

A twelve-year-old Radhika of village Nandeli was being married to a 25-year-old madman. On receiving this information, the CHILDLINE sub center Sakti, reached the spot and got information about the matter Information found to be correct. Police and Child Welfare Committee Janjgir were informed about this. The marriage was stopped while waiting for the officer of the Women and Child Development with the police constable.

After talking to both the parties, it was found that the girl's father had first taken forty thousand rupees from the boys, who had to marry their daughter to that mental person due to not being able to repay the loan. After consulting the girl, it was found that the girl was not ready for marriage. He was forcibly marrying her.

The marriage was stopped by the CHILD HELP LINE team with an affidavit explaining the both parties.

CASE STUDY-2

Case Type- Sexual Abuse

Assistance in shelter and care to the girl child victim of sexual abuse

16-year-old Rani of Kanchanpur village under Police Station, Sakti lived with her father with two sisters and a brother after her mother eloped with another man. Being from a poor family, she go to work in a house of Money Lander(Marwadi), where the girl was repeatedly physically abused by Money lander's son. After a few months, when the girl migrated to another state to work with her father and brother, after seeing her growing up Stomach, the neighbors asked for the girl's father to be examined she in hospital.

After getting examined by the father in the local hospital, it was found that the girl is 7 months pregnant. After this, the girl's father brought the girl back to her home village. CHILDLINE went to outreach in the said village. During this time the villagers were informed that the said girl is pregnant. Which has been exploited, After getting the information, the CHILDLINE team consulted the girl and her father, an FIR was lodged against the accused person in the local police station Sakti, on the order of the District Child Welfare Committee, the CHILDLINE, under the protection of the girl The other day, After being presented in the CWC and Special Court, the minor was born girl child, and the accused was sent to jail under Section 4, 6 Pocso and Section 376 of Rape against minor girls. A girls child of said minor girls who has been given protection in the mother house (Matrugh) and further action is going on.

CASE STUDY-3

Shelter is given in the local Girls Child Home

Case Type- Selter

A 16-year-old minor had come to Ahmedabad from Madhya Pradesh to work as a laborer with her mother. A 22-year-old boy who had gone to Ahmedabad from village Adhar in Chhattisgarh to work with his grandmother and sister, both the boy and the girl lived in one place; both loved each other, then a few days later the boy left



Ahmedabad, and return his home village in Chhattisgarh. the girl, along with one of her friends, came to the boy's village and stayed at the boy's house, which was reported to the local police post- Adbhar, under the charge of the police, taking the two girls with them and handing over the CHILDLINE Sub Center After that, the girls are pledged to the District Bal Kalyan Samiti by the team of CHILDLINE Sub Center Sakti, and on the orders of Bal Kalyan Samiti, shelter is given in the local Girls Chi
